- Part of "Alliterative Revival" of late 14<sup>th</sup> century – Langland's *Piers Plowman*, Clerk's *Destruction of Troy*, *Winner and Waster*, *Parliament of the Three Ages*, *Alliterative Morte Darthur*
- Late 14<sup>th</sup> century
  - *Pearl*
  - *Cleanness/Purity*
  - *Patience*
  - *Sir Gawain and the Green Knight*

#### Language

- Northwest Midlands Dialect
- Much different from Chaucer's English, despite being roughly contemporary
  - SGGK at Michigan (<https://quod.lib.umich.edu/cgi/t/text/text-idx?c=cme;idno=Gawain>)
  - compare to Chaucer (<http://www.librarius.com/cantales.htm>)

#### Stanza Format

- Stanza in alliterative verse – Alliterative Revival, as noted earlier
- *bob and wheel* – 2-syllable divider line ("bob") and a 4-line ballad stanza ("wheel")
- Combination of French/Latinate and English poetic styles

#### King Arthur

- More legendary than historical
- Possibly based on historical figures, but no one candidate
- British tradition - Mostly Welsh stories
  - *Goddodin*, *Mabinogion* most famous
- Continental tradition - tales of the court and of the loves of knights
  - Geoffrey of Monmouth - 12c *History of the Kings of Britain* - Latin work used as a source on the continent
